#### DeAnn Ellis

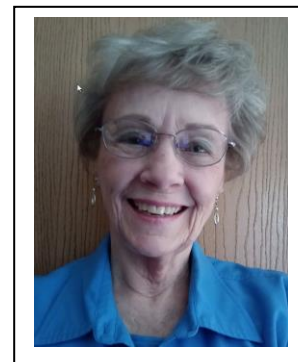

### Medical Mission

On February 26: I have returned from my long-postponed medical mission to Chiapas, Mexico.

We had a wonderful trip with a small group of 5 Canadians and Americans, and about thirty volunteers from the Chiapas area. Over the two weeks, in three villages, we saw 471 medical patients and filled

1260 prescriptions.

The eye team did 391 eye exams, gave out 56 pairs of

sunglasses, 152 fitted prescription glasses,

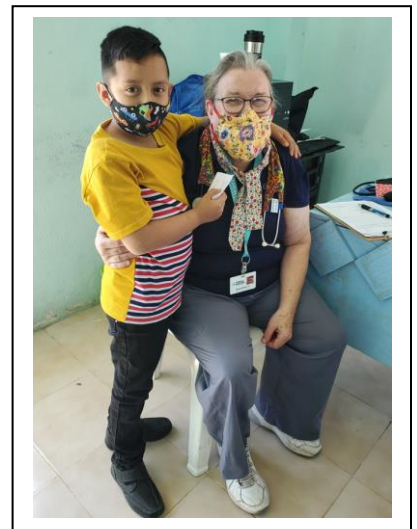
86 readers, and 27 frames for people to use with lenses made locally. Several

people were also scheduled for

cataract surgery in the spring. The

audiology team

cleaned out 53 people's ears and fitted 9 hearing aids. We also had dentists but I do not have their stats.



Many thanks for the cloth bags for medicines, the t-shirt fabric washcloths, and the eyeglass cases! They were treasured.

I am planning on going again next February, and possibly also this November. I can use

- Washcloths made from 2 pieces of t-shirt fabric serged or zigzagged together, I usually cut 8 1/2" or 6 1/2" squares because it is easy, but size does not really matter. (I can also use leftover scraps to cut from if you are making t-shirt quilts.)
- Eyeglass cases
- Readers of any strength (like the ones lying around that your eyes have outgrown!)
- Sunglasses
- Diabetic testing supplies (call me about what is really useful)
- Cloth bags with some sort of tie or drawstring for handing out the packets of medicine. They can be any size from about 5" square up to 8 by 10. A piece of ribbon sewn into the side works fine for a tie. I have also used narrow strips of selvedge. All colors welcome!

I also delivered a big bag of flannel hearts for the NICU at Hinsdale. I have extra flannel if you need it.

Because I am caring for my mother half of the week (starting Thursday mornings) I have not been able to be at the meetings. I can be reached on my cell or at Rebecca955@aol.com for questions or comments.

Traditional Needle-turn applique, Contemporary Machine applique and a Faux-Applique technique that gives a new twist on a traditional style of quilting! When you register for the class, you choose which technique you would like to use. All 3 techniques will be demonstrated!

Greg Barner of Greg Barner Quilts will be our lecturer and workshop leader in May.

On May 13, he will work with us on his patterns, Miter Magic, a fast and easy way to make perfect miters and build them into a scrappy quilt. On May 14, he will lead us through his Backsplash pattern.

Looking forward to next year!!

We have some exciting lectures and classes being lined up for the upcoming 2022-2023 year! Look for more information and sign-up information over the next few months.

- In September, Jane Sassaman <http://janesassaman.com>, currently a designer for FreeSpirit fabrics, will provide a lecture on the creative process she uses in designing fabric, and she will lead a workshop using some of the decorative stitches in your machine.
- In October Carl Hentsch <http://www.3dogdesignco.com>, pattern designer and author of books including *New York Beauties & Flying Geese*, *Amish Inspired Quilts*, and *Stars and Stripes Forever*, will give a lecture on Amish Inspired Quilts for Today, and will lead a workshop that includes techniques for foundation piecing, Y-seams and templates.

If you have ever been to Quilt Week in Paducah, Kentucky, you will recognize many of the locales in this new book, *Quilt City Murders* by Bruce Leonard.
